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I. INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the 2011 Annual Report for the Urbana Division of Police. The purpose of this report is to give our review of the Urbana Police Division to our community and to describe the issues that are related to public safety that have affected us throughout 2011. We hope you enjoy reading about who we are and what we are doing to provide law enforcement for the community.

After the Introduction, **Chapter II—Division Personnel** provides information about our personnel. We said goodbye to Chief Pat Wagner, who retired on May 21, 2011, after a thirty-eight year career. Matt Lingrell, a 27-year veteran of the Division, was promoted to Chief of Police on September 14, 2011, becoming the 9th police chief in the 143-year history of the Division. At the close of 2011 we found the Division four officers below its full complement of staffing, but we did see the return of our two officers who'd been on lay off status since early 2010. One returned to us in March and the other in December. At the close of 2011, the Division is made up of 19 sworn officers, including the Police Chief, 4 Sergeants, and 14 Officers.

Chapter III—Major Monthly Activities lists the highlights from each month. This chapter will give you information on some of our more interesting activities in 2011.

Chapter IV—Training lists the type of training Division employees received in 2011. Training is an on-going and important facet for all police personnel. Training is necessary to improve the development of police personnel and to stay current on the ever-changing laws, technology, and police practices; and as a result, it improves the quality of our service to the community.

Chapter V—Staff Activities are handled primarily by the Chief, Lieutenant, Sergeants and specially assigned Patrol Officers and assigned civilian personnel. This section highlights some of those functions.

Chapter VI—Patrol Activities provides insight into what type and with what frequency the Division handled 13,511 calls in 2011.

Chapter VII—Crime in Urbana presents the investigation approach of the Division along with the crime statistics for Urbana. In 2011, the Division completed its third full year of having officers assigned specifically to criminal investigations, after we moved a Sergeant and an Officer into this Unit in late 2008. This unit oversees all Criminal Investigations for the Division, and is responsible for long term investigations.

Chapter VIII—Division-Related Activities covers some extra events that Division personnel have been involved in throughout 2011.

Chapter X—Goals covers what our 2012 Division plans are.

Chief Matt D. Lingrell is a life-long resident of Urbana and a graduate of Urbana High School, Class of 1981. He earned an Associate's Degree in Criminal Justice from Clark State College in June of 1984. Chief Lingrell and his wife Krista are the parents of Marcus, Seth, and Sara. He is the son of Bill (deceased) and Catherine Lingrell and brother of Milissa (Gary Oakes), Noel (Tom Tullis), Kristen (David Alspaugh), and Andy. In addition to serving under Chief Bill Lingrell (1984 – 1997), Matt has also served for Chief Fred Brown (1997 – 2001) and Chief Pat R. Wagner (2002 – 2011).

Chief Lingrell was officially promoted to Police Chief on September 14, 2011, by Urbana's Director of Administration, Bruce J. Evilsizor. He is the 9th police chief in Urbana's history.

During his swearing in, Chief Lingrell's family will hold the bible upon which he'll take the oath.

His family will then pin Chief Bill Lingrell's badge upon Chief Matt Lingrell's uniform jacket. That badge will be worn on the Chief's uniform for the next 44 days, and will then be replaced with the badge currently worn by Urbana Police Officers.


On Chief Matt Lingrell's final day in office, he will once again wear his father's badge.

Mission Progress in 2011

A quality based mission requires us to constantly look for ways and means to improve the services we deliver to the community. We believe that by doing these things we do our part in keeping Urbana a pleasant place to live, work and visit. In 2011 we accomplished this by:

- We continued to build on the longtime great relationship we have with the Urbana City Schools, by requiring one of our Investigative officers to make weekly visits to all five schools within the city to discuss joint issues of concern with each school's principal. We also assigned area cars to patrol each school zone during the beginning and end of each school day.
- We added less-lethal Bean-bag shotguns to our police cruisers to give the
 officers another option to use in some resistance type incidents. These weapons
 were a part of a federally funded grant we used to purchase tactical and
 investigative equipment for the Division at no cost to the city.
- In June, Chief Lingrell proposed new legislation, which City Council passed unanimously, making it illegal to manufacture, possess, use or sell designer drugs known as "Bath Salts" and "Synthetic Marijuana", giving Urbana officers the authority to arrest violators caught with these substances. This law helped us at a time we began experiencing a spike in complaints involving impaired individuals under the influence of these now illegal substances. This law went into effect prior to the State of Ohio acting on a statewide law forbidding the substances.

- In July, Chief Lingrell made a presentation to City Council and city staff on the topic of "Responding to an Active Aggressor" to help prepare them to respond in the event an incident of violence takes place during a City Council or City Staff meeting.
- While maintaining a strong effort towards law enforcement needs throughout the community, we began promoting a better effort towards establishing police-community partnerships in providing better service needs to our community. We did this by taking on a leadership role in developing new programs such as the Drug Drop-off program where we partnered with the Urbana Hearth and Home team in July to collect old unused medicines from local citizens to be discarded of properly. We also developed and provided our 1st ever "Police-Community Night Out", held at the Wendell Stokes Municipal Pool which we held in August and was attended by over 400 citizens. During this event we provided a static display of police related equipment for our visitors to experience, and enjoyed a night of fun, food and prizes as we swam and listened to Dee-Jay music. The event helped us in promoting community involvement in crime and drug prevention, strengthening police-community partnerships, and encouraging neighborhood camaraderie as part of our effort to have a safer Urbana.
- In August the Division used a vacant Twain Avenue home, scheduled for demolition by the city, to conduct training exercises involving tactical forced entries and building searches by officers utilizing our tactical gear and weapons. The training was conducted by our own trainers and was a great opportunity for the entire division to practice tactics to what is commonly a very dangerous part of policing, forced entries and building searches. Due to the high cost this training day could have resulted in, the officers volunteered their own time to receive this training. They were rewarded with good training and good grill cooked food.



Mr. Bob Massie and Mrs. Kay Moffitt are assigned as Part-time Records Clerks for the Division. They are responsible for handling report requests from officers, the courts, the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, citizens and insurance companies. They also handle collecting and documenting statistics on police functions, including administrative,

criminal and traffic activities. They answer phone requests and direct citizens with questions who come to Records. They cover the Records Unit Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m.

Herman "Nick" Nichols is the Part-time Parking Enforcement Officer for the Division. He works various daytime hours and may be seen checking for parking violations throughout the downtown area and around shopping centers and schools.

Police Chaplain

John Ware serves the Division as its Chaplain as he's done for over 44-plus years.

Personnel Vacancies

To be appointed as a Patrol Officer with the Division, applicants must successfully pass the civil service test(s), the Cooper Standard physical fitness test, a comprehensive background investigation, a polygraph test, a psychological test, and interviews with the Police Chief and Police Lieutenant as well as with the Director of Administration.

At the close of 2011, the Division was four Officers below its full complement of 23 sworn Officers. In 2011 we did see the return to full-time status two Officers who had been placed on lay off status due to the economic situation the City began working its way out of in 2011.

Promotions

Matt D. Lingrell was promoted from Lieutenant to replace 38-year veteran Pat R. Wagner as Police Chief on September 14, 2011. At the close of 2011 we were continuing the promotional process to fill Lingrell's vacated Lieutenant's position.

III. MAJOR MONTHLY ACTIVITIES

January 2011

On January 3, 2011 at 6:25 a.m. Urbana Police and Fire Divisions responded to a house fire at 958 North Main Street. During the investigation of the fire it was found to be of a suspicious nature and a criminal investigation was begun. Through the

investigation, Urbana police arrested Crystal Castle, age 26, and Donnie Wilson, age 47, charging them both with Aggravated Arson, a 1st degree felony. Both were later convicted of those charges and were sentenced to long prison sentences. Urbana Police were assisted in this investigation by the Urbana Fire Division and the State Fire Marshall.

On January 31st at 5:42 p.m. police were called to the Wright Patterson Credit Union on a reported attempted robbery. While in the early stages of their investigation the Urbana Police Division issued a BOLO to surrounding police agencies to attempt to locate a suspect vehicle. Soon, thereafter, the same suspect reportedly robbed another business in a nearby community. When he was stopped by police there, he pointed a weapon at them and they returned fire, killing the suspect.

February 2011

In February, police investigated a Breaking and Entering case at the Super Wal-Mart store involving the theft of two 40-inch LCD television sets valued at \$1,500.00. The investigation found that two suspects worked together in committing the theft. They'd come in and cut the lock off of a rear delivery door which they then used to exit the store after stealing the merchandise. Two men were identified and arrested for their involvement in the crime. One man, 24-year old Brandon Henry, was located in the Butler County Jail and the other man, 45-year old John Coile Jr., was found in the Mercer County Jail. Both men were later indicted and convicted for the theft.


March 2011

In March, Urbana police began a search for a missing 17-year old girl, along with her infant son and the 19-year old father of the baby. For several weeks police followed up on leads and had entered the missing people into national law enforcement databases for missing and exploited children. Police believed the 17-year old had left on her own free will but family and police were concerned for her and the infant's safety. Finally in June, Urbana police provided information to the Hutto, Texas police regarding possible whereabouts of the missing people. Using that information, Hutto police took the 17-year old and the 19-year old man into custody and placed the infant into child protective custody. All three were later returned to Urbana where the 19-year old faced unrelated criminal charges in another case.

April 2011

On April 7th, at 1:18 a.m. while officers were processing an arrest from a traffic stop involving an unlicensed driver who was also in possession of heroin, they became the victims of a drunk driver crash. At 1:27 a.m. while the officers were processing the traffic stop and preparing to have the car towed, another car being driven by an intoxicated driver, crashed into the two police cars, resulting in heavy damage to one cruiser and minor damage to the other one. Officers Shawn Schmidt and Chris Snyder

as well as an arrestee from the initial traffic stop sustained minor injuries from the crash. The intoxicated driver was charged with OVI, Negligent Assault and Resisting Arrest.

On April 17th, at 12:46 a.m. police were called to an auto crash with shots fired in the parking lot of the United Dairy Farmer's store on Miami Street. Their investigation found that the driver of the car had jumped out of it while it was moving to escape from two men who were robbing him at gunpoint. The robbery began after a drug transaction involving the victim, in the alleyway behind a home in the 400-block of East Church Street. Once the car crashed in the UDF parking lot, the robbers fled the area on foot, but were identified by the victim. Before the night was over, Jacob Greene, age 18, and Cain Calloway, age 18, along with two juvenile females were in police custody, charged with felonies of Kidnapping and Aggravated Robbery of the victim. The Victim, Sean Jones, age 20, was charged with Felony Trafficking in Drugs and Drug Possession.

Also in April, the Investigative Unit conducted city-wide compliance checks for alcohol sales to underage persons using a confidential police informant. Police issued citations into court to three local businesses for selling to an underage person, without checking their identification. While police were disappointed in the fact three businesses sold to an underage person, they were happy that 11 other business did not sell to the underage person.

May 2011

On May 11th, after a lengthy investigation that began in 2010 involving the theft of

money from the Urbana City Pool, police were able to obtain a conviction against a comanager for felony theft. After being found guilty on theft charges, Neddra Armstrong, age 48, was sentenced to a jail term, placed on 3-years probation and ordered to reimburse the city for \$4,230.08 in missing funds.

June 2011

In June several officers helped by providing traffic safety and control throughout the city during the Great American Bicycle Adventure (GOBA) during their visit to Urbana on June 24th. Over 2500 bicyclists visited or passed through Urbana during the day which was day 6 of a week-long excursion which began and ended in Kenton, Ohio.

July 2011

On July 12th, the Urbana City Council unanimously passed new legislation proposed to them by Interim Chief Lingrell, outlawing the manufacture, possession, sale or use of bath salts or synthetic marijuana, making any violation of this law a 1st degree misdemeanor offense.

Also on July 12th, Interim Chief Lingrell made a presentation to City Council and City Staff on the topic of "Responding to an Active Aggressor Incident".

On July 16th, from 8:00 a.m. until noon, Urbana officers worked in partnership with the Urbana Hearth & Home staff to provide a Drug Drop-off program to Urbana citizens in front of the Barbara Howell Park on East Market Street. The staff from Hearth & Home offered free blood pressure checks along with free bottled water and snacks to our visitors. Officers manning the drop-off point met with several local residents using the opportunity to get rid of old medicines, and were able to collect a total of 481 prescription bottles of pills totaling 40 pounds in weight. These collected narcotics were then turned over to the United States Drug Enforcement Administration to be disposed of.

August 2011

On August 2nd, from 7 until 9:30 p.m. the Police Division hosted it first ever "Community Night Out with Police" at the Urbana City Pool. Officers provided numerous activities for guests to do including swimming, dancing and Dee-jay music. Police officers and some wives cooked over 400 hamburgers and hotdogs with chips and drinks to share with our guests. A Police static display of equipment was set up which allowed our visitors to see some of our tactical tools, the opportunity to see how speed radar works and the chance to sit inside a police car to use its siren and lights. The night ended with a free raffle giveaway of prizes for our visitors, both for youngsters and adults.

On August 15th, at 1:41 a.m. police responded to an apartment fire at 223 Berwick Drive, Apt. B. During the investigation of the fire it was determined to be an arson fire. The investigating officer in the case, Todd Pratt, obtained and served a search warrant for the apartment and the victim/resident was interviewed further. During this part of the investigation, it was determined that the victim/resident, Suzanne Yates, age 54, was responsible for starting the fire. The fire resulted in over \$30,000 in fire damage. She was charged and found guilty of aggravated arson and was sentenced to 4 years in prison. Urbana Police were assisted in this investigation by the Urbana Fire Division and the State Fire Marshall.

September 2011

On September 7th, 2012 at 12:20 a.m. Urbana officer Kip Michael stopped the driver of a suspicious acting vehicle on South Edgewood Avenue. The officer soon found that the driver, 36-year old Gabriel McCall, was driving while under a court suspension and had an active warrant for him out of Union County. During the tow inventory of the vehicle, officers found numerous containers of illegal bath salts and synthetic marijuana, both outlawed in Urbana in July of 2011. These became the first arrests by Urbana Police using the new legislation making it illegal to manufacture, possess, sell or use the substances. McCall was charged with multiple counts of felony and misdemeanor drug violations.


Later, during the same shift while investigating two new but separate complaints, officers made two more arrests involving the possession and use of synthetic marijuana, using the new legislation.

In September Urbana police broke up a local burglary ring involving four men and a juvenile that committed burglary, theft and vandalism cases throughout Urbana and Champaign County between July and August of 2011. These cases included burglaries to several residences and businesses and resulted in value loss of \$30,000. The ringleader, Kevin McGuffey, age 22, was indicted by a Champaign County Grand Jury on 25 criminal counts including grand theft of a motor vehicle, breaking and entering, burglary, grand theft, criminal damaging, possession of criminal tools and retaliation. The retaliation charge stemmed from a vandalism that occurred at an Urbana police officer's home as retaliation for a traffic violation charge filed by the officer against a member of the crime ring. Also charged and indicted for their involvement in this crime ring were, Dylan Tyree, age 20, Jordan Clark, age 21 and Jeremy Lee, age 18, as well as a 17-year old juvenile. McGuffey, Clark and Lee were later given long prison sentences.

On September 21, Urbana police Sergeant Ed Burkhammer arrested Edward Shoffner III, age 25, and Aukeisha Rogan, age 22, both of Urbana for their involvement in a Breaking and Entering and Theft case at the Vernon Funeral Home on Miami Street where a Honda 4-wheeler valued at \$5000.00 was stolen out of a Utility shed on the property. Shoffner was located and taken into custody at his Willowood Circle mobile home. While at the home, police also arrested 25-year old Jimmy Dornon, of Dayton, on a warrant for robbery out of Springfield. A search of the home and outbuildings resulted in Urbana police recovering 102 stolen items including multiple ATV's, motor scooters, numerous tool boxes with construction tools and radio amplifiers.

October 2011

On October 16th, at 7:24 a.m. the United Dairy Farmer store was robbed by a white male, 18-26 years of age, 5"07 tall and weighing 150 pounds. The robber passed a note to the clerk advising he was robbing the store. The robber escaped with money and a box of cigarettes. This case remains unsolved.

On October 22nd, at 2:47 a.m. while investigating a drug complaint at 214 East Reynolds Street, Sgt. David Reese and Officers Shawn Schmidt and Todd Pratt made arrests of two adults and two juveniles on several felony charges including Possession of Drugs, Trafficking in Drugs, and Permitting Drug Abuse. The information collected by the Urbana officers later led to a search warrant being executed at a Champaign County residence for its involvement in local drug trafficking. Urbana Police recovered from the Reynolds Street home a total of 313.1 grams of marijuana along with drug trafficking equipment and supplies.

In October Urbana police began an investigation into the severe beating of an elderly resident inside his Dorothy Moore Drive home on the east side of Urbana during the late night--early morning hours of October 24-25. Police spent several hours inside the crime scene documenting the scene and collecting evidence. In the late afternoon of October 25, a blue 2006 Jeep Liberty stolen from the victim's home was recovered by Springfield police in the Long John Silver's parking lot on South Limestone Street in Springfield, Ohio. Urbana police impounded the car and collected evidence from it to help in their investigation. On November 17, the victim, 87-year old Louis Taylor, died as a result of his injuries from the October assault. This case is now being investigated as a homicide. It remains unsolved and police request anyone with information concerning this crime to contact them at 937-652-4350.

November 2011

On November 12, Urbana police arrested 47-year old Duane Weaver and charged him with kidnapping, felonious assault, tampering with evidence and possession of crack

cocaine after an incident at a Sweetman Avenue home that resulted in serious injuries to a resident and acquaintance of Weaver. Weaver was sentenced to 3 years and nine months in prison after pleading guilty to those charges in Champaign County Common Pleas Court.

Also in November, after a rash of office and dorm room burglaries at Urbana University, officers made arrests of several individuals for their involvement in the crimes. Ja'Quan De'Andre Townsend, age 18, of Macedonia, Ohio, Jordan Page, age 19, of Columbus, Ohio, Sheldon Wesley, age 19, of Columbus, and Maurice Blacknall, age 19 of Dayton were all charged and indicted on several counts of breaking and entering, theft, safecracking and criminal damaging. All were students at the school. Officer Steve Molton was the lead investigator and arresting officer and was assisted by several other officers who helped in working the cases.

December 2011

IV. TRAINING

College Training

Fourteen Officers currently have college degrees (Eight Bachelor's Degrees, and six

Associate's Degrees). In 2011, Ofc. Mike Cooper completed his Associates Degree work in Criminal Justice studies from Clark State Community College.

Weapon's Training

The entire division attends at least three firearms qualifications throughout the year at the Police Firing Range. In the spring we qualify on our semi-automatic handgun as well as on the use of our non-lethal weapons which include the ASP baton and OC Chemical spray. In the summer we qualify on the semi-automatic carbine rifle while in the fall we qualify on the duty shotgun, which are carried in each marked police car. We also offer a fourth range during which time officers who have missed any of the previous ranges can attend and be certified on any weapon. Any officer who carries an approved off-duty weapon is certified during one of the ranges throughout the year. Our Firearms and Weapons trainers are Sergeant Ed Burkhammer—lead instructor, and Officers Chris Snyder and Shawn Schmidt-assistant instructors. Sergeant David Reese and Officer Kip Michael are also certified as Firearms Instructors and can help.

Top Shot Challenge

Sergeant David Reese won the first annual "Top Shot" in a competition involving the entire division, in a timed physical challenge utilizing the ASP baton, carbine rifle and duty handgun after completing a short run. Sergeant Reese had the highest number of "hits" on his range target. This will become an annual challenge with the top scoring officer receiving recognition as the Division's "Top Shot".

Bean-bag less-lethal weapons

In 2011 the Police Division added Less-lethal bean-bag shotguns to the tools we already have available to us for responses to in-progress incidents where less than deadly force may be an option to gain control and compliance from an individual. Officers were trained and qualified with these weapons during the summer Range qualifications for the Division.

Career Development Training

The Division regards training to be an important component of maintaining the high professional standards required from law enforcement today. The goal of our training is to select topics and attendees that will help us meet the needs of both the Division and the officer.

Some of the training highlights in 2011 included:

- In August, the entire division received training in dynamic building entries and tactical searches using our tactical equipment. The city allowed us to use a condemned property on Twain Avenue for our training and officers practiced in teams on forced entries and building searches.
- From May thru July, Sergeant Ed Burkhammer completed the 10-week School of Police Staff and Command from Northwestern University held at the Ohio State Patrol Academy in Columbus.

• In November, Officers Brian Cordial, Todd Pratt, Josh Jacobs and Jason Kizer received training in developing and presenting Crime Prevention programs.

V. STAFF ACTIVITIES

Bicvcle Patrol

Sergeant David Reese is in charge of the Division's Bicycle Patrol program. He oversees the training of new bike officers, and provides minor care and maintenance to the bikes. There are currently seventeen certified Bike Officers on the Division. The Division has seven bikes that are used regularly.

When there is sufficient manpower on a shift, Bicycle Officers may be assigned to conduct patrol on bikes. Throughout 2011, bike officers were required to conduct 20 hours bi-weekly on bike patrol during the summer and early fall months. Among some of the special projects the Bike Officers are responsible for include "Child Bicycle Safety" presentations at the schools, YMCA and City Park, working events like the 4th of July festivities at Grimes Airport, downtown festivals, and the fall parade.

<u>Data Master and Portable Breath Testing (PBT) machines</u>

Officer Shawn Schmidt is responsible for the care, maintenance, and weekly calibration of the Data Master Alcohol Testing Instrument. It is used by the Division on Alcohol and OVI cases to determine how much alcohol a person has consumed. In 2011, there were 89 tests on the machine. Seventeen officers are certified to operate the Data Master. These officers are tested annually by the State of Ohio Health Department and must pass both a written and a proficiency test to remain certified.

• The Division uses Portable Breath Tester's (PBT's) to test for alcohol levels. The PBT's are carried in the police cruisers and can be used to make presumptions of alcohol intake while on the stop or at a call, without immediately bringing the person back to the Division for a Data Master test. These come in handy for officers responding to large underage drinking parties, where several dozen people may need testing. Sergeant David Reese helps to maintain the PBT's and conducts regular calibration checks on them.

Computers

Sergeant John Purinton and Officer Steve Molton are responsible for overseeing our computer technology projects. They act as liaisons with the computer companies that supply and support our records management system. The system is always reviewed and upgraded as needed. In 2011 we undertook a new initiative to change where and how we receive our LEADS – Law Enforcement Automated Data System. This new initiative will cut over \$45,000 in costs over the next 5-years in comparison to the old way we received this same information. In 2012 we will be looking to replace our main server that will be in compliance with the new state standards for low-band frequency reception.

Professional Responsibility Investigations

The professional responsibility investigation process is administered to ensure the integrity of the Division and its employees. Most professional responsibility investigations are handled by the police administration. In 2011, the Division conducted

eight professional responsibility investigation complaints, involving 12 officers. Five complaints were handled administratively for employees who had violated Division Policy.

The results of the eight investigations include:

- Five complaints (involving 8 officers)---were sustained
- Two complaints (involving 2 officers)---the incidents were unfounded
- One complaint (involving 2 officers)---the employees were exonerated

Commendations

Throughout 2011, various officers were honored with Commendations for excellent police work. In addition to these commendations, there were many letters and/or calls from citizens offering thanks to individual officers for assistance they'd provided during the year.

Division Commendations went to:

Sergeant David Reese and Officers Todd Pratt and Shawn Schmidt

Excellent Investigation and Arrest for the April 17, 2011 Aggravated Robbery and Kidnapping of a local resident involving two adult men and two juvenile girls. During this crime, the victim was lured to a dark location within the city to conduct a drug deal. Once at the location, the victim was accosted by the arrestees and was forced at gunpoint to drive around the city. During this drive, the victim crashed the vehicle and then jumped from it while it was moving in an attempt to evade the kidnapper/robbers. Before the shift had ended for the officers involved in the case, four local citizens were in custody, charged with Aggravated Robbery and Kidnapping. The victim in the case was also arrested and charged with Trafficking in Drugs.

Officer Chris Snyder

Excellent Arrest for the May 8, 2011 arrest of a well-known car thief Officer Snyder had observed and stopped while the man was driving a stolen vehicle in the southern part of the city. During the inventory of the stolen vehicle and the search of the arrestee, numerous illegal drug related items were also recovered leading to additional criminal charges.

Sergeant David Reese and Officer Kip Michael

Selfless Dedication to the Police Division for refurbishing, repainting and care of our Tactical ballistic shields and helmets in May of 2011. The efforts by these two officers helped us not only in the care and maintenance to important and expensive equipment, but also in the cost savings to us by having this task completed within the division.

Officer Shawn Schmidt

Excellent Arrest for his efforts on July 12 while on bike patrol at 4:33 a.m. he discovered a man loitering in the alleyway of the downtown business district. Upon stopping and questioning the man, Officer Schmidt discovered a break-in to a local downtown restaurant and upon further investigation discovered a second man inside the business stealing from it. Officer Schmidt was able to take the two men into custody and foil them in their attempts to steal from the business.

Sergeant Seth King and Officers Josh Jacobs and Steve Molten

Excellent Investigation and Arrest for a case involving several individuals responsible for multiple business and residential burglaries, thefts and criminal damaging cases throughout Urbana and Champaign County during the summer of 2011. A tremendous amount of investigative hours went into these cases, which were finally solved on August 30, 2011 after an interview with the ring-leader of a local burglary ring involving five local men. The estimated loss from these multiple cases was over \$30,000. All five men involved were given lengthy prison sentences, after they all plead guilty without going to trial. This was a testament to the strength of the criminal case prepared by the Urbana Officers against the men.

Officers Kip Michael and Chris Snyder

Excellent Investigation and Arrest from a traffic stop of a suspicious vehicle on September 7, 2011 which resulted in the arrest of a local man on multiple traffic and drug related charges. This arrest was the first by Urbana Officers using the new Bath Salt Ordinance, passed by our City Council in July, 2011. In addition to the numerous items of Bath Salts recovered from this individual, we were able to produce a training video where the arrestee in the case explained the uses and effects of the various drugs and drug paraphernalia recovered in his arrest.

Sergeant Ed Burk hammer

Excellent Investigation and Arrests for a case involving numerous theft offenses and the recovery of 102 stolen items, mostly power tools and tool sets, as well as a \$4000 ATV stolen from the Urbana Vernon Funeral Home on September 20. Three adults were arrested and charged for their involvement in some of the theft cases. Police were still trying to tie many of the recovered stolen items to victims before proceeding with additional criminal charges against the three.

Officer Shawn Schmidt

Excellent Investigation and Arrest for the investigation into the December 15, 2011 attempted home-invasion robbery on East Ward Street at 1:02 a.m. that led to the arrest of two men. Due to his quick work in getting out suspects descriptions to other law enforcement agencies, one of the men responsible was caught within a few hours of the crime at his Logan County home, where evidence was recovered and a confession was

obtained. The 2nd man responsible for the crime was located and arrested on December 23, and he too confessed to his part in the crime.

Officer Todd Pratt

Excellent Investigation and Arrest for the investigation into the December 17, 2011 burglary to a Lafayette Avenue residence where over \$1600 of property, including a rifle, were stolen. After conducting numerous interviews with persons associated with the case, an arrest was made of three individuals charging them with the home burglary. The stolen rifle in the case was also recovered.

Response to Resistance Reviews A Response to Resistance Report, or a Firearms Use Report, are required whenever an officer handles a non-compliant person resisting their arrest physically or in unknown weapons type calls. In 2011, Urbana officers used a Response to Resistance Report twelve times, and a Firearms Use Report seven times.

He experienced many different situations faced daily by our officers with service calls, traffic enforcement, crash investigation, criminal investigations, arrests, and time in court. Greyson kept a written log of his activities with us and Lieutenant Lingrell wrote a final evaluation of him that was submitted to the university.

In May, Clark State Community College student Katie Waddle completed her 80-hour internship with the Division.

<u>Disposal of Abandoned and Junk Vehicles</u>

The Division maintains a Police Impound Lot where we generally hold vehicles that have been towed after being determined to be junk/abandoned on streets or properties located throughout the city of Urbana. Once impounded at the Police Lot, vehicles remain there until either the courts order its release, or, the owner corrects the deficiencies, including properly registering it. If they are not claimed by the owners, the vehicles are processed by an officer and a salvage title is obtained. Those vehicles are then sold to a salvage company with proceeds going to the general fund of the city.

Property Room

Officer Brian Cordial is the Property Control Officer for the division. He is responsible for categorizing and managing the input and output of all property brought into the

police division. The Division conducts two audits of its Property Room each year, one is scheduled and the other is set by the Chief but unannounced until the day it is to begin.

In 2011, there were 1,149 Items of evidence, contraband, recovered property, and found property submitted to the Property Room.

Disposal of Property

When the Division no longer needs the property, the Division will dispose of it by either returning the property to the rightful owner or, with a court order, the Division will destroy, forfeit, or auction the property.

Periodically, the Property Officer coordinates the return or disposal of property deemed no longer needed as evidence or for safe keeping. On July 4th each year, the Police Division conducts its annual police auction to rid itself of unclaimed and/or released property. This year's auction brought in a total profit of \$2661.72 which was turned over to the general fund for the city.

The disposal of property for 2011 included:

- 1,149 total new items logged into the UPD property control system
- 114 (including 2 cars) items were auctioned.
- 813 items were destroyed.
- 65 Counterfeit bills were forfeited to the United States Secret Service. Those 65 bills totaled \$1,440.00. The most counterfeited bill is the \$20 bill.

VI. PATROL ACTIVITIES

Calls for Service

The Division handled 13,511 calls in 2011. This number does not include the questions, requests for directions or advice, follow-up, and other daily contacts we have with citizens.

The following is a breakdown of the number and type of calls we handled in 2011.




Adult Criminal Arrests


Parking Enforcement

Traffic Safety Programs

In conjunction with the Ohio Department of Public Safety, Urbana Police participated in two Safety campaigns in 2011. Sergeant John Purinton oversees these traffic safety programs for the division.

In the first campaign, "Click it or Ticket", held May 23 – June 5, Urbana Police made 63 traffic violation stops and issued 30 citations from these stops. Six were for drivers driving on Suspended Licenses, 2 were for seatbelt violations, 1 was for speeding and the rest were for various other violations.

The second campaign, "Drunk Driving – Over the Limit. Under Arrest," ran from August 19 – September 5. During that time, Urbana Police made 63 traffic violation stops and issued 51 citations from these stops. Five were for OVI offenses, 9 were for Speed offenses, and 8 were for drivers driving on Suspended Licenses. The rest were for various other violations.

From March 21-25, 2011 the Urbana Police Division participated in a countywide law enforcement traffic enforcement blitz looking for unsafe or aggressive drivers. Officer Josh Jacobs was assigned to this detail and during the campaign he made twelve traffic violator stops, resulting in four citations, seven written warnings, two assists to the motorist, and two criminal arrests for drug offenses.

<u>Traffic Safety Programs Rewards</u>

For its continuing participation in the National Highway Traffic Safety programs of "Click it or Ticket" and "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" the Division was awarded a new MPH Python III speed radar. This is the 4th year in a row we've been awarded a new radar, which can cost \$1500 new.

Fleet Management

Officer Todd Burkett is responsible for overseeing the Division's fleet. He keeps maintenance records and schedules the cars for maintenance or repairs. He assists in determining new car specifications and making recommendations on new cars. The Division has six marked police cruisers for patrol. We also use and maintain three unmarked cars for use by the Division.

Portable Radar

The police division uses its portable radar sign throughout the city to track data on motor vehicle traffic and to show motorists their speed. It has a bright 18-inch LED digital display that shows motorists their actual speed as they approach. It is very useful around school zones, parks, and streets that are difficult for officers to monitor speed violations on without being seen by the violator. It has also been used by other city divisions to track the total amount of vehicular traffic on given streets to help collect data to be used in grant applications or study requests.

VII. CRIME IN URBANA

Investigations

Patrol Officers are responsible for most initial and follow-up investigations of criminal

offenses in Urbana. This approach develops Patrol Officers who are capable of handling a case from the initial report all the way through to a successful conclusion.

The Shift Patrol Sergeants are responsible for supervising these officers' investigations at a shift level.

We also have two officers assigned to our Investigative Unit to work solely on criminal investigations.

Sergeant Seth King is assigned to the Investigative Unit and is responsible for overseeing criminal investigations on a Division level. Officer Josh Jacobs is also assigned to the investigative Unit and reports to Sergeant King. There is currently one vacant position in the Investigative Unit.

Our Investigative Unit is responsible for the investigation of all major crimes including death investigations, major thefts or frauds, sexual assaults, illegal drug cases, and other complex investigations. This Unit also assists the Patrol Unit with their multi-incident or protracted type investigations.

The Investigative Unit is available to respond to incidents upon request by a Patrol Sergeant, Police Lieutenant or Chief. The Unit acts as a liaison with various criminal justice associates of the Division such as the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation, City and County Prosecutors, Champaign County Children's Services, and many others.

In 2011, our Investigative Unit was involved in 198 criminal cases or police incidents. Many of them were long-term and high-profile investigations which covered many man hours. The Unit made 113 Criminal Arrests and presented many more cases directly to Champaign County Grand Juries throughout the year, leading to criminal indictments, and several convictions.

Crime and Drug Tip Hotline

The Police Division has a Crime and Drug Tip Hotline to assist us in seeking information on various investigations. If you have a crime or drug tip, call 652-4357—upon your request, your name will be kept confidential.

CART

The Child Abuse Response Team (CART) is comprised of members from the law enforcement community of Champaign County. This includes the Urbana Police Division who meets on a bi-weekly basis with other team members from the other county law enforcement agencies, Champaign County Children's Services Department, the Prosecutor's Office, Mercy Well-Child, etc. to discuss and review active cases involving neglect and/or abuse to any reported child in Champaign County.

Our Investigative Sergeant Seth King is our representative on the team and he provides updates to the team of Urbana Police active cases involving child neglect and/or abuse. This team oversees all child sexual abuse and assault cases within the city.

<u>Investigative Reviews</u>

Beginning in 2011, Investigative Sergeant Seth King proposed and began hosting biweekly meetings at the Urbana Police Division with investigative representatives from the Adult Parole Authority, Mechanicsburg Police, Prosecutors, Saint Paris Police and the Sheriff's Department, to discuss and review on-going criminal investigations for each respective agency. The goal of these meetings is to determine if there are any similarities or common issues involving ongoing investigations of criminal activity that can be better developed for an improved response by the investigators.

Vest Grant

Officer Brian Cordial oversees our annual BJA Bulletproof vests grant. We've been using this grant for many years to offset the costs associated with purchasing new vests each year. Officer Cordial maintains the grant which pays half of the costs to the vests we obtain each year. We rotate officers into new vests at least every five years (lifetime use of the vest). In 2011, four Officers received new vests at a cost of \$2,636. The Grant paid \$1,318 of this cost.

New Equipment

In 2011 the Division obtained the following new equipment

- Three Nikon digital cameras to replace two broken ones used by the Patrol Unit (the old extra patrol camera was moved to the Investigative Unit to use).
- Cardinal Peak audio/video recording system for our Investigative Interview rooms.
- Seven Kenwood portable radios to replace ones that were over 5 years old.

Crime Statistics

The Division uses the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) to report our crime statistics to the State of Ohio and to the F.B.I. The NIBRS system (1) collects information on 53 separate pieces of data on an incident, (2) links offenses and arrests, (3) reports up to ten offenses for each incident, (4) distinguishes between attempted and completed crimes, and (5) reports data for victim/suspect relationships, victim, suspect, and arrestee characteristics, crime location, weapon involvement, and drug/alcohol involvement.

VIII. DIVISION RELATED ACTIVITIES

Fraternal Order of Police

Our Fraternal Order of Police Organization was very involved with community projects throughout 2011. They held their annual fundraiser "Golf Scramble" in May at the Liberty Hills Golf Club. The profit from this event is used by the FOP to further their outreach efforts within the community and for the Police Division.

Some of the outreach programs the FOP is involved with are:

- Urbana High School Scholarship: the FOP provides a one-time monetary scholarship to graduating children of Urbana Police Officers, to help defray some of the costs associated with the student's first year in college.
- Sponsorship of Urbana Youth Sports teams: each year the FOP is very generous in sponsoring youth sports teams associated with the Urbana Youth Sports recreation programs.
- Fair purchases: The FOP purchases livestock during the sales of youth presenters.
- Donations: the FOP donates to individuals during times of personal loss or medical need. They also donated a boys and girls bicycle to the Urbana Parents Teachers Association (PTA) for their annual summer event. The FOP also donated a monetary prize to be given away during Lawnview's "Turkey Shoot".
- Halloween: the FOP stages a candy (\$500) giveaway station in the back parking lot of the Police Division for the trick or treaters to enjoy. Officer Steve Molton and his son, Sam (Safety Pup), meet and greet our visitors.
- Christmas: the FOP, with help from the Urbana community, provided (90) local families and (195) children with Christmas gifts. This was year two of an FOP initiative to help the less fortunate by inviting the community of Urbana to assist us in our endeavor to create a "Wish Gift Christmas Tree" that is on display in the main hallway of the Municipal Building leading up to Christmas. Using Wish tags placed on the tree by a family in need, community members and FOP members purchased matching gifts for the age/sex listed on the wish tag. FOP members made delivery of the baskets and gifts during the week leading up to December 25th.

IX. GOALS

The following have been identified as goals for the Urbana Police Division for 2012. This information sheet is intended only as an index for the goals.

- 1. Implement a Survey of Police Services by citizens who have had contact with an officer(s) from the division. This will result in each officer being reviewed by survey 48 times during the year. Our goal of the survey is to help in our commitment to providing exemplary services by monitoring:
 - Overall agency performance

- Overall competence of agency employees
- The Officer's demeanor with his citizen contact
- Community recommendations and suggestions for improvements
- 2. Implement a monthly Shift-level review/evaluation of officers by their respective sergeants to identify shift level successes, highlighted cases, on-going police related concerns, and to identify areas needed for improvement. Our goal of the reviews is to make it a priority to identify and document areas of successes and areas needing improvement to make certain that division-wide we are meeting our Division Mission of providing professional, quality service with integrity and teamwork, to keep Urbana a pleasant place to live, work and visit.
- 3. Review and update the police division's Policy and Procedure manual.
- 4. Implement our first ever Safety Town, after it was built and given to us in a partnership between the City of Urbana, the Police Division and Urbana High School student, Sam Molton, as he worked to attain his Eagle Scout award.
- 5. Implement our first ever Citizen's Police Academy to help us to increase public knowledge, awareness and confidence in the Urbana Police Division.

X. CONCLUSION

We hope you enjoyed reading the 2011 Annual Report for the Urbana Division of Police. We hope you have learned more about your Police Division and your community. The Division will consider much of this information when making future operating decisions.
