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Greetings to all,

Welcome to the 2013 Annual Report for the Urbana Police Division. We are honored to provide law enforcement and community service to the Urbana community. 2013 was a challenging but very successful year for the division. I hope that with this report, our readers will understand how we have met our Police Mission of providing professional, quality service with integrity and teamwork, to keep Urbana a pleasant place to live, work, and visit.

We implemented a new Drug Enforcement strategy that helped us to have great success in combating the illegal drug problem in Urbana. The new strategy required a division-wide effort to address drug investigations, both covertly and overtly. The year end results showed 308 arrests for drug trafficking and/or drug

abuse crimes, almost twice as many as we'd handled in 2012. Eight covert search warrant raids of drug houses were conducted resulting in numerous criminal arrests and prison sentences for drug felons, but also in the vacating of 6 of the 8 homes raided. Of the people not sent to prison, but given different judicial penalties, many moved out of Urbana.

In addition to our on-going outreach programs, in 2013 we provided the ALICE training for many local organizations on how to respond to an active shooting incident. We also provided Concealed Carry training and licensing to 22 members of our community. Throughout the year we made improvements to our website, urbanaohio.com (Police) by providing more information to FAQ's as well as historic and current police information for our readers to have.


We currently have 19 officers, four officers short of full staffing. The average Urbana Police Officer is 43 years old and has over 17 years with the division. We have fourteen officers over the age of 40 and no officers under the age of 30. Although I am very proud of the 19 officers who work hard to provide great service for our community, in 2014 we need to strive hard to increase staffing for the division, as we face difficult and dangerous investigations such as the unsolved 2011 Louis Taylor homicide and the ongoing challenge of illegal drugs and all of its associated crimes within our community.

You can expect the officers of Urbana Police Division to continue with a commitment they've made to each other in 2014, to strive to meet 10-Core Principles of the UPD that we shared during a recent Division meeting. Those Core Principles give each of us direction in a renowned commitment to one and other and in helping the community to have a police force that cares for and looks out for the safety and well-being of each other in responding to everyday police challenges.

It is truly a blessing to be supported by the great community of Urbana as we work hard to provide the best law enforcement and community service for our citizens and visitors.

I. INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the 2013 Annual Report for the Urbana Division of Police. The purpose of this report is to give our review of the Urbana Police Division to our community and to describe the issues that are related to public safety that have affected us throughout 2013. We hope you enjoy reading about whom we are and what we are doing to provide law enforcement and community service for the citizens and visitors of Urbana.

After the Introduction, **Chapter II—Division Personnel** provides information about our personnel. We currently have 19 Officers, 4 short from the 23 we have had in past years. The average UPD officer is 43 years old and has over 17 years with the division. We have fourteen officers over the age of 40 and no officers under the age of 30. Fourteen of our 19 officers have college degrees. Currently, the Division includes the Police Chief, Lieutenant, 4 Sergeants, and 13 Officers, as well as two part-time Records Clerks and a part-time cleaning person.

Chapter III—Major Monthly Activities lists the highlights from each month. This chapter will give you information on some of our more interesting activities in 2013. In this section, you will see how much time and effort went into our efforts to address the illegal drug problems facing our community. We feel that we had great success in enacting a new Drug Enforcement strategy for our Division, but there are many challenges still ahead as we do our part to drive out the drug traffickers and drug abusers from our community.

Chapter IV—Training lists the type of training Division employees received in 2013. Our training hours have decreased drastically in the past few years as a result of a tough economy but we continue to adjust accordingly. Training is an on-going and important facet for all police personnel. Training is necessary to improve the development of police personnel and to stay current on the ever-changing laws, technology, and police practices; and as a result, it improves the division, the employee, and the quality of our service to the community.

Chapter V—Staff Activities are handled primarily by the Chief, Lieutenant, Sergeants and specially assigned Patrol Officers and assigned civilian personnel. Beginning in March and several times throughout the year we provided business and civic organizations with the A.L.I.C.E. training on how to respond to an active killing incident. In April we provided Concealed Carry training to 22 city employees, partners to the UPD and/ or family associates. Throughout the year we provided a Community Drug Awareness program for various organizations. This section highlights some of those functions. This section also highlights some of the commendations where we recognize outstanding efforts by various UPD employees.

Chapter VI—Patrol Activities provides insight into what type and with what frequency the Division handled 13, 854 calls in 2013, a decrease of 1,006 calls from 2012.

Chapter VII—Crime in Urbana presents the investigation approach of the Division along with the crime statistics for Urbana. We implemented a new division-wide drug enforcement strategy in January and saw many successes throughout the year as we worked hard to address the serious drug issues our community is seeing. This new policy resulted in 308 criminal arrests

for drug related crimes and saw police conduct 8 raids upon homes where drug trafficking and/or abuse was occurring throughout the city.

Chapter VIII—Division-Related Activities covers some of the extra events that Division personnel have been involved in throughout 2013. Our Fraternal Order of Police organization provides a community Easter egg hunt for youngsters in April, Halloween treats in October and a Community Christmas in December.

Chapter X—Goals covers a review of our 2013 goals and what our 2014 Division plans are.

Chapter IX—Conclusion.

Mission Progress in 2013

A quality based mission requires us to constantly look for ways to improve the services we deliver to our community. We believe that by doing these things we do our part in keeping Urbana a pleasant place to live, work and visit. In 2013 we accomplished this by:

A. New Drug Enforcement Strategy implemented

In January the police division implemented a new strategy to fight the overwhelming issue of illegal drug abuse and trafficking in Urbana. The results of the new strategy showed we had tremendous success in our new efforts to combat this issue.

- 8 Search Warrant Drug Raids of homes were conducted in 2013, which in addition to the criminal prosecutions against the individuals from those locations, resulted in 6 of the 8 homes becoming vacant due to the raids.
- We developed and presented many more drug arrests for prosecution than in recent years.

- Several Covert cases were conducted resulting in numerous criminal arrests and indictments for drug traffickers and abusers in Urbana.
- A large amount of illegal drugs were removed from the community.
- We solved many additional theft related cases through our drug investigations.
- We removed several handguns from the streets.
- We began to get our public's full attention on our desire to force the drug abusers and traffickers either out of the city or underground.

- **B.** In 2013 we continued with the 2012 initiative of conducting monthly **Citizen Survey's of Police Services** in regards to our Officer's response to Calls for Service and Incidents. We issued division wide monthly and quarterly reports on our findings. Our goal in surveying the public we've served is three-fold:
- 1. To identify levels of satisfaction from those surveyed.
- 2. To identify areas of concern regarding the service provided by the respective employee.
- 3. To let the officers know that the representative work and effort they are providing for the city and our police division is going to be reviewed periodically.

We do not shy away from surveying all types of police services and oftentimes the person we survey has been arrested, issued a traffic citation, or been the victim of a crime. While we are finding that the overwhelming percentage of those surveyed are pleased or supportive of the response the officers gave to their incident or crime, we actually are more concerned with the surveys that give a perspective that the person being surveyed was dissatisfied with the level of service we provided in their case, and to use the information to improve our services.

The Survey acts as a "Report Card" from the perceptions of our community members. In 2013 our surveys revealed to us the following:

- 122 surveys were completed
- 119 respondents indicated they were treated professionally, courteously and/or respectfully. This amounts to 98% of respondents. Of the remaining 3, only 1 indicated they were not treated in this manner. The other two were nonresponses.
- 73 respondents indicated that they were "Very Satisfied" with their overall interaction with UPD Offices, which is 60%. An additional 44 respondents said they were "Satisfied" (36%). Only 4 citizens said they were "Not Satisfied."
- 68% of those surveyed (83 citizens) indicated that they would rate the quality of service they received as being "Above Average." Only 2 respondents, rated the service received as being "Below Average."
- Lastly, only 4 respondents, less that 4%, said they would not feel confident in requesting future services from the Urbana Police Division.

C. Shift Level Reviews

In 2013 we continued with a 2012 initiative of conducting monthly Shift Level Reviews of each Patrol Unit and the Investigative Unit. These reports are conducted by the respective Sergeant of the Unit. We require monthly reviews to be completed which then serve as an internal "Report Card" from the supervisor on the monthly activities of their employees. What the Administration is looking for from these internal reviews are the following:

- 1. To ensure that the goals of the Administration and the Shift are being met.
- 2. To ensure we are working efficiently to complete case investigations in a timely manner to bring closure to open cases.
- 3. To ensure we are doing all that we can to provide appropriate training opportunities for the employees.
- 4. To ensure we are recognizing and celebrating outstanding efforts and successes of our officers throughout the month.

Note: This process also helps keep supervisors abreast of issues involving employees, the shift and the division. While we ask the supervisors not to include individual shortcomings of individual officers within this report, the reviews offer a perfect opportunity for supervisors to address any shortcomings they observe involving an employee's work effort.

- **D.** Work continued on revamping the former Armory Motor Pool building into a new site for large evidence/property storage for the police division as well as the site where we will hold some of our court ordered towed vehicles.
- **E.** We updated the Police Division's portion of the City's Website, making it more user friendly and offering interesting segments about the past and present police division.
- **F.** In April we provided 22 city employees, family members or associates with Concealed Carry training and licensing. Sergeant Dave Reese was the presenter for the day long of training.
- **G.** In 2013 we provided Active Shooter Response to various local organizations throughout the county. Officer Chris Snyder provides the training for the A.L.I.C.E. program, which stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter and

Evade. This training helps guide individuals or organizations with how to Develop, Practice, Follow and Review a Plan with the most up-to-date preferred protocol to use in these events. The ALICE program was presented to the following organizations: Rittal, YMCA, Schaeffer/RT Bundy's, Cable United Methodist Church, St. Paris Library, CRSI, & Heartland.



III. MAJOR MONTHLY ACTIVITIES

January 2013

On <u>January 18</u>, 2013, Urbana police made arrests for an early morning burglary to the vehicle and equipment building for the Parks Division of the City of Urbana, located at 831 Children's Home Road. A Park's Division employee walked in while the burglary was taking place and the suspects fled the scene. Responding officers captured the two burglars, Ronald Morgan, age 26, and Troy Byrd, age 25 of Urbana and recovered \$1000 worth of stolen property.

On <u>January 23</u>, 2013, Urbana police responded to a suspicious vehicle and person complaint in the area of east side shopping centers. The description of the vehicle matched that of a one used in a January 13 purse snatching incident at Wal-Mart.

When an Urbana officer arrived at Walmart, the SUV took off, leading police on a pursuit through the city and towards Springfield. Once the vehicle was stopped, its driver, Jacqueline Sample, age 29, of Springfield was found under the influence of drugs. It was found that Sample had actually been injecting drugs during the chase. Also recovered inside the car was stolen property from various crimes in Urbana and the surrounding area, including items from the purse stolen on January 13 in Urbana.

Also in <u>January</u>, police began having immediate success with their newly implemented Drug Enforcement strategy, when four city residents were arrested for multiple felony drug trafficking cases, after covert undercover investigations were conducted by police throughout the city. Those arrested included: Urbana residents John A. W. Dellinger, age 23, Kelly A. Moore, age 21, Shea M. Vanhoose, age 26, and Brandon W. Ireland, age 31.

February 2013

On <u>February 10</u>, 2013, at 2:01 a.m., after an OVI traffic stop was made in the 300-block of East Market Street, Paul Lindsay, age 31, of Bellefontaine, was found in possession of a large amount marijuana, packaged for trafficking. Lindsay resisted his arrest and it took multiple officers to subdue him. Inside the car, officer's located additional prepackaged marijuana along with a set of digital scales commonly used to weigh marijuana before a sale. Altogether, police recovered over 100 grams of marijuana during the stop. Lindsay, a registered sex offender, was on parole and had an extensive criminal history which includes rape and sexual battery convictions as well as corruption of a minor. A Grand Jury returned multiple Indictments against Lindsay for the drug related charges, as well as multiple traffic charges including his 3rd OVI, and multiple Driving under Suspensions.

On <u>February 14</u>, 2013 at 1:55 a.m., police were investigating drug offenses taking place at 1060 South High Street, #12. During this investigation, police arrested Charlie R. Arnold, age 31 of Springfield, and Jordan A. Boardman, age 22, 1060 South High Street, #6, Urbana, after they were found in possession of a large amount of marijuana and various drug abuse related paraphernalia. Police recovered a half-pound of marijuana during their investigation. These drug crimes were committed in the presence of a three year old child. Both men were later indicted for drug crimes.

March 2013

In <u>March</u> Urbana police presented a large theft ring case to a Champaign County Grand Jury for indictments regarding multiple theft cases between November 24, 2012 and January 2, 2013 at Walmart. The police investigation showed a large theft ring was operating that was involved in stealing merchandise from Walmart which was then returned to the store for a refund. One of the members of the theft ring was a Walmart employee who assisted in the return process. Police found that thousands of dollars was lost to this theft ring. Assisted by Walmart Asset Protection Agents, police developed cases and made arrests against several individuals. All later pled guilty to theft related charges and were sentenced through Common Pleas Court. The ringleader, Scott Rollins, 40, Mechanicsburg, was assisted in the criminal enterprise by the following Urbana residents: Amber J. Jenkins, 29, (former Wal-Mart employee who assisted the ring during the return process), Kelly L. Rockhold, 50, Ashley N. Gibson, 24, Brittany D. Gibson, 27, Elvin H. Burkhart IV, 34, Kristen Tatman, 24, Troy Byrd, 25, Deborah Hopewell, 47, Ronald Morgan, 26, Cheryl Jackson, 51, and, Matthew R. Arms, age 36, and, Mildred Porter, 47, Mechanicsburg.

April 2013

On <u>April 4</u>, 2013, at 4:47 p.m. several Urbana Patrol and Investigative Officers raided 329 East Court Street as part of an ongoing undercover drug investigation. Police obtained a court ordered search warrant for the residence and during the search; officers recovered numerous evidentiary items connecting the residents and some visitors to the home at the time of the raid, to felony drug crimes. Those drugs included heroin, cocaine and marijuana and these crimes were committed in the presence of a young child. Arrested and charged as part of this drug investigation were: Kevin Gevedon, age 25, 329 East Court Street, Brittney Gevedon, age 24, 329 East Court Street, Aaron M. Cole, age 21, LKA: Bellefontaine, Jeremy Green, age 28, 329 East Court Street, and, Zachary Waller, age 19, Mechanicsburg.

On <u>April 10</u>, 2013, at 3:20 pm, Urbana Police Officers discovered a meth lab operation in connection with an ongoing undercover drug investigation they were working at 1046 North Russell Street. While acting with a court ordered search warrant, police found numerous items in and around the property indicating the production of methamphetamine. The production of methamphetamine is an extremely dangerous and volatile process that leaves behind hazardous by-products and waste. Not only were the lives of the producers at risk, but there was a danger to the three children, ages 9, 10 and 13, believed to be living in the home at the time, as well as nearby neighbors.

Police arrested Anthony L. Cole, age 39, Lisa D. Cole, age 36, and Timothy J. Salyer, age 33, all of 1046 North Russell Street. All three were later found guilty and sentenced to prison for their felony drug crimes. Salyer received a 17-year prison sentence while both Cole's received 5-year sentences.

Urbana Police Division Officers were assisted in their investigation by a Detective with the Champaign County Sheriff's Office and a Patrolman of the Sidney Police Department, both of whom have specialized training in the clean-up and neutralization of meth labs. The Urbana Fire Division also assisted in the clean-up.

On <u>April 25</u>, 2013, at 10:04 a.m. several Urbana Police Patrol and Investigative Officers raided 452 East Church Street, #A, as part of an ongoing undercover drug investigation. Police obtained a court ordered search warrant for the residence and during their search of the premises, officers recovered heroin, cocaine, marijuana, a large amount of cash, and drugs packaged for trafficking as well as numerous other evidentiary items connecting a resident to felony drug crimes. Some of the drug crimes had been committed in the vicinity of a school. Urbana Police were assisted at the scene by Bellefontaine Police who provided a Police K-9 drug dog to assist them in their search for drugs.



James D. Breneman, age 34, of that address was arrested and taken into custody. At the time of the raid, Breneman was under a court ordered house arrest bond, and was wearing a court monitored ankle bracelet when taken into custody. He later was found guilty of drug trafficking and numerous other felony drug crimes and was sentenced to 9.5-years in prison.

May 2013


On <u>May 1</u>, 2013, at 5:28 p.m., Urbana police responded to a Robbery in Progress call in the parking lot of Big Lots, 747 Scioto Street. Police learned that a man had confronted a 63-year old woman and attempted to steal her purse. The suspect fled the scene in a vehicle without the purse when he realized police had been contacted.

While responding to the area, Patrol Officer Jeff Roberts observed the suspect driving a vehicle and stopped it just outside the city limits on South Route 68, and the suspect was taken into custody.

26 year old Dustin Macy, of Urbana, who stands 6'05" tall and weighs over 300 lbs., was charged with the robbery and pled guilty of this crime in court. He was sentenced to 3 years of community control.

On <u>May 3</u>, 2013 at 10:30 p.m., several Urbana Police Officers conducted another Drug Raid when they served a search warrant at 239 East Reynolds Street, Apt. B. Police recovered drugs and drug paraphernalia during the search.

The residence is the home of Brenda Minnifield, age 51, Cullen Minnifield, age 20, Shelby McCullough, age 18, Dylan McCullough, age 19, and a 19-month old son of Cullen Minnifield and Shelby McCullough.

Urbana Police charged the adults from the home with Drug Abuse and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. In addition to those charges, Brenda Minnifield was charged with Endangering Children. All four were found guilty and sentenced in Municipal Court.

June 2013

During the first two weeks in <u>June</u>, Urbana police conducted two Safety Town programs for incoming kindergartners. This was the 2nd year we've put on Safety Town and Officers Steve Molton and Jason Kizer were the presenters for the two weeklong programs. Each week ended with a graduation ceremony involving the students, parents and police staff. Additional organizations that help us in providing safety education during Safety Town include: the Urbana Fire Division, Champaign County Job & Family Services, and Urbana City Schools.



July 2013

On <u>July 24</u>, 2013, at 8:27 p.m., Urbana Police responded to a robbery-in-progress at Lil's Drive thru, 636 Scioto Street. Officers were on scene within 3 minutes of the robbery, but the robber had already escaped. Several months later our Investigative Unit solved this robbery with the indictments of Jeremy Howard, 23, of South Charleston, and his girlfriend Nachole Griffin, 28, of Springfield, both of whom had already been sentenced to prison on various other robberies they'd committed in surrounding communities. Howard, the robber, is serving a 20-year prison sentence while Griffin, his accomplice, is serving a 2-year sentence.

August 2013

On <u>August 1</u>, 2013, from 7 until 9:30 p.m. the Police Division hosted its 3rd annual "Community Night Out with Police" at the Urbana City Pool. Officers provided numerous activities for our guests including swimming, dancing and DJ music. Several police officers and their families helped to cook hamburgers and hotdogs to go along with chips and soft drinks for over 150 guests. A Police static display of equipment was set up which allowed our visitors to see some of our tactical tools, the opportunity to see how speed radar works and the chance to sit inside a police car to use its siren and lights. Our mascot, Officer Stanley, was a huge hit with young and old alike. We ended our night with a free raffle giveaway of prizes for our visitors.

On <u>August 8</u>, 2013 at 10:04 a.m., several Urbana Patrol and Investigative Officers raided 583 East Ward Street as part of ongoing undercover drug investigations. Police obtained a court ordered search warrant for the residence and during their search officers recovered numerous evidentiary items connecting the resident's and frequent occupants of the home to drug crimes. These crimes were committed in the presence of a young child. The search warrant was the result of an undercover investigation that began in May, 2013 and included covert drug investigation along with tips from citizens.

Misdemeanor drug charges and child endangering charges were filed against Richard A. Moore, 58, and Tammy L. Moore, 52, and they were sentenced for those crimes through Municipal Court.

On <u>August 30</u>, Urbana police arrested Nathan Henry Maddox, 31, of 302 East Church Street and charged him with starting two separate arson fires to a garage there. In addition to the August 30 arson, this was the same location of an arson fire that occurred there on February 25, 2013. Each fire led to extensive damage to the garage and contents, as well as to a nearby garage and vehicles parked nearby. On both arson occasions, responding Urbana Fire and Police Divisions found the garage heavily engulfed in flames.

During an interview with Maddox by police on August 30, information was collected that led police to charging him with starting both arson fires. He later pled guilty to 2-counts of Arson and was sentenced to prison for 2.5 years.

September 2013

On <u>September 18</u>, 2013, Lieutenant Seth King and Sergeant Josh Jacobs, along with Agents from the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigations, were presenters at the annual statewide Ohio Investigative Officers Association conference held Sept. 18 – 20 at the Columbus Crowne Plaza Hotel. The team presented a 3 ½ hour overview of the March - 2012 Jessica Rae Sacco homicide investigation which resulted in the arrests and convictions of five individuals.

On **September 19**, 2013 at 12:39 a.m., Officers of the Urbana Police Division took action on information related to a drug house operation that began with a citizens' tip, regarding drug activity at 809 Concord Street. During the investigation, Officers seized heroin, crack cocaine, marijuana, as well as assorted drug paraphernalia and drug abuse instruments from the home. The police investigation showed that misdemeanor and felony drug violations were being committed in the residence while an infant child was present. Arrested from the raid were: Christopher Lee Jones, 38, Springfield, who was found hiding in a closet inside the home and resisted his arrest. He was charged and pled guilty to Obstructing, Resisting arrest, and Possession of marijuana & paraphernalia. Kevin Lyle May, 29, Urbana, was charged and pled guilty to Operating a vehicle while under the influence, Possession of heroin, Possession of crack cocaine, and Possession of drug paraphernalia & drug abuse instruments. He was sentenced to community control. Tecko Baruti Peterson, 35, Springfield, was charged and pled guilty to Possession of heroin, Possession of crack cocaine, Possession of drug paraphernalia, Possession of drug abuse instruments, and consuming from an Open container in a motor vehicle. At the time of the raid, he also had an active felony warrant from Clark County. He was sentence to 2.6 years in prison on those charges.

October 2013

On <u>October 11</u>, 2013 at 10:10 p.m., after several months of an undercover investigation of felony drug crimes, several Urbana Officers conducted a search warrant raid of 940 South High Street where evidence of felony (cocaine) and misdemeanor (marijuana) drug crimes was recovered. Arrested and indicted for drug crimes involving were Richard Robinson III, 43, and his wife, Deborah, 42.

On <u>October 23</u>, 2013, acting on a tip, Investigations Officers visited a west side home and discovered a small indoor marijuana grow operation taking place. Plants and drug items, including an 8 foot tall plant and over 1500 grams of prepared marijuana were confiscated from the home. This case was still under investigation at the close of 2013.

November 2013

In **November** the Police Division was awarded \$7,000 from a local Foundation, who requested to remain anonymous, to be used towards the purchase and implementation of a long-desired project to upgrade how the Urbana Police Division obtains fingerprints from both arrestees and the general public who need background checks completed. The new system, known as WEBCheck, cost \$13,075.00. This large donation made the hope a reality as the system was obtained and will be used, beginning early on in 2014.

December 2013

In <u>December</u>, Officers Mike Cooper & Jason Kizer completed a project to renovate the UPD Conference room and add a long desired Honors Memorial display cabinet, where past, present and future police awards and memorabilia will be displayed for officers and our citizens to enjoy.

College Training

Simulator Training in April 2013

In April the Urbana Police hosted the Attorney General's Driving and Firearms Training Simulators. Officers are run through various real life scenarios that they may face daily and are evaluated on how they respond. Decision making, verbal communication and response to resistance type activities are what the officers are faced with while handling the scenarios. Weapon's Training

The entire division attends at least three firearms qualifications throughout the year at the Police Firing Range. In the spring we qualify on our semi-automatic handgun as well as on the use of our non-lethal weapons which include the ASP baton and OC Chemical spray. In the summer we qualify on the semi-automatic AR-15 carbine rifle while in the fall we qualify on the duty shotgun, both of which are carried in each marked police car. Any officer who carries an approved off-duty weapon is certified during one of the ranges throughout the year. Our Firearms and Weapons trainers are Sergeant Ed Burkhammer—lead instructor, and Officers Chris Snyder and Shawn Schmidt-assistant instructors. Sergeant David Reese and Officer Kip Michael are also certified as Firearms Instructors.

Top Shot Challenge

Officer Shawn Schmidt was the winner of the Division's 3rd annual "Top Shot" challenge in a competition involving the entire division. This year's challenge involved a timed physical and mental challenge utilizing the carbine rifle, duty handgun and shotgun after officers completed a short run. Officer Schmidt had the highest number of "hits" on his range target. Previous year's winners were Sergeant Ed Burkhammer (2012) and Sergeant David Reese (2011).

Career Development Training

The Division regards training to be an important component of maintaining the high professional standards required from law enforcement today. The goal of our training is to select topics and attendees that will help us meet the needs of both the Division and the officer.

V. STAFF ACTIVITIES

Bicycle Patrol

Sergeant David Reese is in charge of the Division's Bicycle Patrol program. He oversees the training of new bike officers, and provides minor care and maintenance to the bikes. There are currently seventeen certified Bike Officers on the Division. The Division has seven bikes that are used regularly.

When there is sufficient manpower on a shift, Bicycle Officers may be assigned to conduct patrol on bikes. Throughout 2013, bike officers were required to conduct 32 hours bi-weekly on either foot or bike patrol during the summer and early fall months. Among some of the special projects the Bike Officers are responsible for include "Child Bicycle Safety" presentations at the schools, YMCA and City Park, patrolling events like the 4th of July festivities at Grimes Airport, downtown festivals, and the fall parade.

Data Master and Portable Breath Testing (PBT) machines

Officer Jason Kizer is responsible for the care, maintenance, and weekly calibration of the Data Master Alcohol Testing Instrument. It is used by the Division on Alcohol and OVI cases to determine how much alcohol a person has consumed. In 2013, there were 108 tests on the machine. Seventeen officers are certified to operate the Data Master. These officers are tested annually by the State of Ohio Health Department and must pass both a written and a proficiency test to remain certified. The Division also uses Portable Breath Tester's (PBT's) to test for alcohol levels. The PBT's are carried in the police cruisers and can be used to make presumptions of alcohol intake while at the scene of an incident involving alcohol. These come in handy for officers responding to large underage drinking parties, where several dozen people may need testing. Officer Mike Cooper helps to maintain the PBT's and conducts regular calibration checks on them.

• **Sergeant David Reese** was rewarded as a "TOP COP" by the Southwest District of MADD organization after he was nominated based on his 29 OVI arrests in 2013. His shift was responsible for 89/108 UPD arrests in this category.

Computers & Technology

Sergeant John Purinton is responsible for overseeing our computer and technology projects. He acts as a liaison with the computer companies that supply and support our records management system. The police division's technology programs are always in a state of review and update and are upgraded as needed.

<u>Professional Responsibility Investigations</u>

The professional responsibility investigation process is administered to ensure the integrity of the Division and its employees. Professional responsibility investigations are handled by the police administration. 2013 was a special year in that the Division only had to conduct one professional responsibility investigation, involving 1 officer. That complaint was determined to be unfounded and was dismissed as such.




Sergeant David Reese



Response to Resistance Reviews

A Response to Resistance Report, or a Firearms Use Report, is required whenever an officer handles a non-compliant person resisting their arrest physically or in unknown weapons type calls. In 2013, Urbana officers used a Response to Resistance Report twenty-three times and a Firearms Use Report twelve times.

In 2013 Response to Resistance Reports or Firearms Use Reports includes:

Each Response to Resistance Report or Firearms Use Report is reviewed and commented on by a team of Urbana Officers, chaired by Lieutenant Seth King, which make recommendations for improvements that are submitted to the Police Chief. This internal review was also reviewed by the City Law Director, Breanne Parcels.

Property Room

Officer Brian Cordial is the Property Control Officer for the division. He is responsible for categorizing and managing the input and output of all property brought into the police division. The Division conducts two audits of its Property Room each year, one is scheduled and the other is set by the Chief but unannounced until the day it is to begin.

In 2013, there were 1,216 Items of evidence, contraband, recovered property, and found property submitted to the Property Room.

Disposal of Property

When the Division no longer needs the property, the Division will dispose of it by either returning the property to the rightful owner or, with a court order, the Division will destroy, forfeit, or auction the property.

Periodically, the Property Officer coordinates the return or disposal of property deemed no longer needed as evidence or for safe keeping. On July 4th each year, the Police Division conducts its annual police auction to rid itself of unclaimed and/or released property. This year's auction brought in a total profit of \$8,270.00 which was turned over to the general fund for the city.

The disposal of property for 2013 included:

- 1,216 total new items logged into the UPD property control system
- 118 (including 2 cars) items were auctioned.
- 686 items were destroyed.

VI. PATROL ACTIVITIES

Calls for Service

The Division handled 13,854 calls in 2013. That was a decrease of 1,006 calls from 2012 when we handled 14,860 calls. This number does not include the questions, requests for directions or advice, follow-up, and other daily contacts we have with citizens.



Traffic Safety Programs

In conjunction with the Ohio Department of Public Safety, Urbana Police participated in two Safety campaigns in 2013. Sergeant John Purinton oversees these traffic safety programs for the division.

In the first campaign, "Click it or Ticket", held May 20 – June 2, Urbana Police made 66 traffic violation stops and issued 56 citations from these stops. Eight were for speeding violations, 9 were for drivers driving on Suspended Licenses, 1 was for seatbelt violations, 1 was for OVI, and 37 were for various other violations.

The second campaign, "Drunk Driving – Over the Limit. Under Arrest," ran from August 16 – September 2. During that time, Urbana Police made 114 traffic violation stops and issued 90 citations from these stops. Six were for OVI offenses, 10 were for Speed offenses, and 12 were for drivers driving on Suspended Licenses. The rest were for various other violations.

<u>Traffic Safety Programs Rewards</u>

For its continuing participation in the National Highway Traffic Safety programs of "Click it or Ticket" and "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over"; the Division was awarded free new MPH Python III speed radar. This is the 6th year in a row we've been rewarded with a new radar, which normally costs \$1,500.00.

Fleet Management

Officer Todd Burkett is responsible for overseeing the Division's fleet. He keeps maintenance records and schedules the cars for maintenance or repairs. The Division has five marked police cruisers for patrol. We also use and maintain three unmarked cars for use by the Division.

Portable Radar

The police division uses its portable radar sign throughout the city to track data on motor vehicle traffic and to show motorists their speed. It has a bright 18-inch LED digital display that shows motorists their actual speed as they approach. It is very useful around school zones, parks, and streets that are difficult for officers to monitor speed violations on without being seen by the violator. It has also been used by other city divisions to track the total amount of vehicular traffic on given streets to help collect data to be used in grant applications or study requests.

VII. CRIME IN URBANA

<u>Investigations</u>

Patrol Officers are responsible for most initial and follow-up investigations of criminal offenses in Urbana. This approach develops Patrol Officers who are capable of handling a case from the initial report all the way through to a successful conclusion.

The Shift Patrol Sergeants are responsible for supervising these officers' investigations at a shift level.

We also have two officers assigned to our Investigative Unit to work solely on criminal investigations. Sergeant Ed Burkhammer is assigned to the Investigative Unit and is responsible for overseeing criminal investigations on a Division level. Officer Shawn Schmidt is also assigned to the Investigative Unit. There is currently one vacant position in the Investigative Unit.

Our Investigative Unit is responsible for the investigation of all major crimes including death investigations, major thefts or frauds, sexual assaults, illegal drug cases, and other complex investigations. This Unit also assists the Patrol Unit with their multi-incident or protracted type investigations.

The Investigative Unit is available to respond to incidents upon request by a Patrol Sergeant, Police Lieutenant or Chief. The Unit acts as a liaison with various criminal justice associates of the Division such as the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation, City and County Prosecutors, Champaign County Children's Services, and many others.

In 2013, our Investigative Unit was involved in numerous criminal cases or police incidents. Many of them were long-term and high-profile investigations which covered many man hours. The Unit made 132 Criminal Arrests and presented many more cases directly to Champaign County Grand Juries throughout the year, leading to criminal indictments, and several convictions.










Crime and Drug Tip Hotline

The Division made 1594 adult criminal arrests in 2013. 299 were for felony charges and 1295 were filed as misdemeanor crimes.




Total Felony Charges -- 299

CART

The Child Abuse Response Team (CART) is comprised of members from the law enforcement community of Champaign County. This includes the Urbana Police Division who meets on a bi-weekly basis with other team members from the other county law enforcement agencies, Champaign County Children's Services Department, the Prosecutor's Office, Mercy Well-Child, etc. to discuss and review active cases involving neglect and/or abuse to any reported child in Champaign County.

Our Investigative Unit is our representative on the team and they provide updates to the team of Urbana Police active cases involving child neglect and/or abuse. This team oversees all child sexual abuse and assault cases within the city and the county.

Crime Statistics

The Division uses the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) to report our crime statistics to the State of Ohio and to the F.B.I. The NIBRS system (1) collects information on 53 separate pieces of data on an incident, (2) links offenses and arrests, (3) reports up to ten offenses for each incident, (4) distinguishes between attempted and completed crimes, and (5) reports data for victim/suspect relationships, victim, suspect, and arrestee characteristics, crime location, weapon involvement, and drug/alcohol involvement.

New Equipment

In 2013 the Division obtained the following new equipment

- New Weapons We completed an upgrade to the Officers duty weapons, as well
 as tactical rifles and shotguns that are carried in all front line patrol cars. The
 Division budgeted for this upgrade but also traded in old weapons that had been
 forfeited to the Division as part of the purchase deal. With the trade-in of
 accumulated weapons, as well as the weapons being replaced, what normally
 would have cost the Division \$21,000 to complete this deal only cost the Division
 \$6,500. This upgrade should serve the Division for many years to come.
- Tactical entry tools for dynamic entries into locked or secured doors.
- Tactical response bags to carry extra supplies for officers responding into a hot zone involving a shooting incident.
- New Cruisers (2)
- Police Bikes (2)
- Mobile Data Computers (2)
- Renovated UPD Conference Room, adding an Honors-Memorial display case to display past, present and future historical items to share with our community (this work was completed by UPD employees).
- (FREE) Digital Camera (2) Donated to the Division by a local business.
- (FREE) Speed Radar, valued at \$1,500.00 from the Ohio Department of Highway Safety for our continued involvement in statewide traffic safety programs. This is our sixth straight year of receiving a free one for our participation in traffic safety initiative programs. A new one costs \$1,500

Vest Grant

Officer Brian Cordial oversees our annual BJA Bulletproof vests grant. We've been using this grant for many years to offset the costs associated with purchasing new vests each year. Officer Cordial maintains the grant which pays half of the costs to the vests we obtain each year. We rotate officers into new vests at least every five years (lifetime use of the vest). In 2013, four Officers received new vests at a cost of \$3,295.00. The Grant paid \$1,647.50 of this cost.

VIII. DIVISION RELATED ACTIVITIES

Fraternal Order of Police

Our Fraternal Order of Police Organization was very involved with community projects throughout 2013. They held their annual fundraiser "Golf Scramble" in May at the Liberty Hills Golf Club. The profit from this event is used by the FOP to further their outreach efforts within the community and for the Police Division.

Some of the outreach programs the FOP is involved with are:

- Urbana High School Scholarship: the FOP provides a one-time monetary scholarship to graduating children of Urbana Police Officers, to help defray some of the costs associated with the student's first year in college.
- Easter egg Hunt: The FOP partnered with the Gil & Jana Weithman family, as well as the Urbana High School's National Honor Society students to provide 2600 candy eggs for youngsters at our 2nd annual Easter egg hunt. Sergeant Josh Jacobs spearheaded this effort.
- Sponsorship of Urbana Youth Sports teams: each year the FOP is very generous in sponsoring youth sports teams associated with the Urbana Youth Sports recreation programs.
- Halloween: the FOP stages a candy (\$500) giveaway station in the back parking lot of the Police Division for the trick or treaters to enjoy. Officer Brian Cordial and his family handed out the treats.
- Christmas: the FOP, with help from the Urbana community, provided (100) local families and (200) children with Christmas gifts. Using Wish tags placed on the tree by a family in need, community members and FOP members purchased matching gifts for the age/sex listed on the wish tag. FOP members made delivery of the baskets and gifts during the week leading up to December 25th.



IX. GOALS

The following were identified as goals for the Urbana Police Division to try to accomplish for **2013**. Those in **bold** were accomplished successfully.

- 1. Implement a new Drug Enforcement Strategy for the Division to help us fight the overwhelming issue of illegal drug abuse and trafficking in Urbana. The results of this new strategy showed we had tremendous success in our efforts to combat this issue.
 - The Division made 308 drug arrests in 2013, compared to 171 cases in 2012 and 108 cases in 2011.
 - The Division conducted 8 Search Warrant Drug Raids of homes where drug trafficking and/or drug abuse crimes were happening, resulting in 6 of the 8 homes becoming vacant due to the raids.
- 2. Refurbish the Armory motor pool building into a new Evidence / Property / Vehicle storage location to replace the old holding trailers currently used.
 - While work did begin by the city to make this goal a reality, there are still some building repairs that have not been completed at the close of 2013 that would complete this goal. We expect this goal will be met in 2014.
- 3. Conduct a feasibility study on implementing a K-9 program to assist with drug interdiction and suspect and/or missing person searches.
 - While our study showed us a K-9 program was needed in Urbana, we decided that Federal FLSA requirements in how a K-9 officer is compensated made the idea something that would be unsustainable in meeting those federal compensation requirements.
- 4. Review and update the police division's Policy and Procedure manual.
 - We were able to review and update 13 General Orders in 2013 and hope to complete the remaining General Orders reviews in 2014.
- 5. Replace and transition to new duty weapons to replace our current weapons which are 14 years old.
 - We were able to replace all duty weapons for our officers as well as new shotguns and tactical rifles for all front line patrol cars.

2014 Goals

The following have been identified as goals for the Urbana Police Division for **2014**. This information sheet is intended only as an index for the goals.

- We will continue Drug Investigations We will continue with our Drug Enforcement strategy begun in 2013, and will train an officer to be certified in Meth Lab cleanups.
- 2. Justify our need to increase our manpower to meet the needs of the division & our community. We are still operating 4 short of full strength.
- **3.** Completing General Order review/implementation. We completed 13 chapters in 2013, but still have several more to go in 2014 to be finished.
- **4.** Conduct a Drug Drop-off program for citizens to have an opportunity to turn in old, unused medications for proper disposal by the UPD.
- **5.** Develop and present new crime prevention and/or safety programs for our community.

X. CONCLUSION

We hope you enjoyed reading the 2013 Annual Report for the Urbana Division of Police, and learned more about us and your community. The Division will consider much of this information when making future operating decisions.

In 2013, we implemented a new Division wide strategy for handling Drug Enforcement and saw great success as we conducted numerous undercover investigations and raided eight residences where drug trafficking and drug abuse crimes were occurring. Those efforts led to 6 of the 8 drug homes becoming vacant as either the people we arrested at those locations were sent to prison, or moved out of the city.

We added new programs to our already numerous outreach efforts with presentations on the current Urbana drug trends to various community groups, multiple presentations of the ALICE program for responding to an active shooter incident, and by providing Concealed Carry training and licensing for 22 city employees and/or their family members or associates of the UPD.

We hope to build on the successes we found in 2013 and continue to provide great law enforcement and community service to the Urbana community.

In closing, we want to thank Mayor Bill Bean, Director Kerry Brugger, City Council and the Urbana community for giving us so much support through the year. We want to serve our citizens with honor and respect and return the best police service to them they so richly deserve.
